

Recipe for Success

Identifying Idioms

In this lesson, students will discover the story of a record-breaking Nigerian chef as they analyze and interpret the figurative language present in the text.

Learning Objective(s)	Students will be able to determine the meaning of idioms found within a text.	
Materials/Resources	Nigerian Chef Whips Up a Record! Figurative Language Graphic Organizer	
Vocabulary	Verify: make sure something is true or official; Donated: give away; Nonprofit: not designed to make money Deducted: subtracted or taken away.	
Anticipatory Set	Write the following idiom on the board, "This marathon was a piece of cake." Review the meaning of an idiom: a phrase that means something different than the literal meaning. Ask students to share what they think "a piece of cake" means in this sentence. [Sample response: the marathon is easy] Explain to students that today they will be reading an article about a Nigerian chef who made history by cooking for nearly 100 hours nonstop.	
Mini-Lesson	 Begin by reading the title of the article Record. Ask students what they believe means. Support students by asking we that is "whipped'? Independent Practice	Students will continue reading the rest of the article independently, writing idioms in their graphic organizers as they go. [Paragraph 7: put Nigerian cuisine on the map and chase their dreams] After they have found the idioms, have students write what they think each idiom means. [Sample answer: Make Nigerian food more famous or popular and pursue their goals and ambitions]
Closure/Assessment	Have students pair up and discuss what they wrote. Invite students to share their idiom meanings with the whole class.
Differentiation	Adjust lexile® levels as needed; answer questions as a whole group; use accessibility features or read-to-me feature as needed; print copies of article
